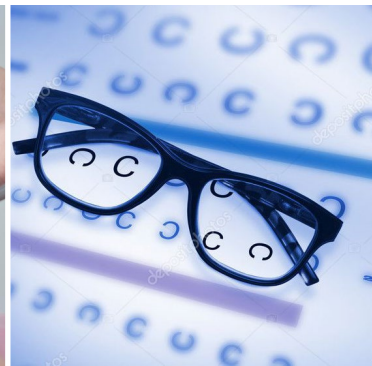

# From the Manager's Desk

The summer may be a great time for rest and relaxation, but here at the Township we are as busy as ever. You entrust us with your hard-earned money, so we owe it to you to reinvest it back into the community in projects that you see immediately, as well as to pay for other initiatives that may not necessarily be as visible now but will pay dividends in the future.

By the time you receive this newsletter, the Township would have finished or begun almost \$2 million worth of road upgrades and repairs throughout the Township, which includes complete re-paving projects as well as milling, shoulder repairs, and line-striping work on over a dozen different roads. The Township continues to implement our multi-year bridge replacement program. This spring, we replaced a small bridge on Petersburg Road, just to the south of the Yellow Breeches Creek. We have also just received bids for the replacement of a small bridge on Red Tank Road, with work planned for this fall. Finally, if everything goes perfectly, we may even be able to complete a third bridge this year, if not, early next year, the small Zion Road bridge, about 100 feet to the south of the new Craighead Bridge. This work would not have been possible without the Township's Road Tax.

The \$2.8 million Children's Lake restoration project is proceeding as planned. D'Appolonia Engineering of Pittsburgh was selected as the firm to design the dam repair, wall bank stabilization, and environmental improvement work. The remainder of 2019 and much of 2020 will be devoted to design and permitting, with work anticipated to take place in the winter of 2021. The Township continues our fruitful partnership with Franklin & Marshall College to continue studying the Bubble, to ensure its future protection.

After a bit of delay, the Boiling Springs Sidewalk/Street-Scaping project received a tremendous boost this year. Originally planned to break ground this summer, the Township delayed commencement of the project, with the hopes that the original multi-year phase approach could be sped-up through supplemental State grant funding. We also sought ways to minimize the cost borne by local taxpayers. This summer, the Township was awarded a \$500,000 State Multi-Modal Transportation grant to help fund the project. The purpose of this project is not only to install additional pedestrian facilities, making walking in the village safer, but to also install traffic-calming devices

to slow vehicle traffic as cars enter Boiling Springs. It is the Township's hope that design work will take place over the remainder of 2019, with work to begin next year to coincide with the Children's Lake work.

The Township also received over \$60,000 in State and Federal funding to help study the northwest area of the Township, oriented around Walnut Bottom Road. Due to this corridor's close proximity to I-81, the location of UPMC-Pinnacle Hospital, and a number of high-opportunity properties, this area offers a tremendous opportunity for redevelopment. Therefore, this fall, the Township will begin a seven-month study of the area to provide future land use and design guidance for development that could focus on providing mixed-use commercial, professional, and residential development in the area.

The Township continues to implement our Federally-mandated storm water program (also known as MS4). Please be sure to read in this, and all future newsletters, information on our MS4 program, along with tips that you can do everyday to ensure our streams remain clean. Also, to meet pollutant runoff requirements, the Township will begin construction of a new salt storage facility to more efficiently store our salt and road materials, a requirement under MS4. The new facility should be constructed in time for the winter.

We continue to implement components of the Spring Meadows Park Master Plan. Trail work has begun off of Sheely Lane to connect the South Middleton School campus to the park. This trail was funded, in part, by a County Land Partnership grant. Additionally, this fall we anticipate beginning a full master plan study of the Township's other nearby parks (South Middleton, Lehman, and Yellow Breeches Parks).

Finally, as we move through August, the Township is well underway in developing its 2020 Budget. In addition to our core roles of ensuring proper funding for emergency services and road maintenance, the Township will also consider updating its Comprehensive Plan. Because of a growing population, development pressures, and demand on our infrastructure, this is a key tool for future land use planning, including zoning. The last time the Township updated its Comprehensive Plan was 2007. More information on this important initiative will be covered soon.

## Westgate Storm Water District Created

In June, the Board of Supervisors took an action that will hopefully address an ongoing issue in the Westgate development with the establishment of a new storm water district there. For a number of reasons, over the past many years, the storm water management ponds in Westgate were not being consistently maintained. Ordinarily, a homeowners association (HOA) would be responsible for ongoing maintenance of these ponds, supported by homeowner fees. However, the HOA in Westgate is no longer in operation and is, therefore, unable to properly manage the ponds. This is a unique situation that is not found elsewhere in the Township. Therefore, beginning next year, the Township, through the new district, will take over operation of the ponds directly, to ensure they are properly maintained. To support this, the Township will levy a \$100 annual fee on every developed lot in Westgate (and Westgate only). Look for a line item charge on a future sewer bill.

## Coming Soon to a Storm Drain Near You

Storm inlets along roadways or parking lots allow runoff water from rain or snow melt to enter into the storm sewer system which discharges directly into our local waterways. Stormwater runoff washes soil, debris, oil, leaves, grass clippings, pet waste, and fertilizers into storm drain inlets. Material flowing into a storm drain does not get treated before emptying into our local waterways. Anything other than stormwater is a potential pollutant that can contaminate our waterways if dumped into the storm sewer system. Although the individual storm drains may contribute small amounts of pollutants, the combination of many storm drains can cause a negative impact on water quality.

South Middleton Township wants to ensure that our storm sewer system discharges clean stormwater into our waterways. All of the storm drains in South Middleton Township connect to the storm sewer system and discharge into local waterways including Children's Lake, Yellow Breeches Creek, and LeTort Spring Run. All of our waterways are connected to the Susquehanna River and the Chesapeake Bay. An illicit discharge occurs when an individual dumps anything other than stormwater into our storm drains which will pollute these waterways.

The Township is currently coordinating with Boy Scout Troop 171 for an Eagle Scout project that will educate the community about stormwater and benefit our local waterways. Storm drain markers, also called inlet markers, will be placed by troop members on storm drains, at select inlets, to inform and educate the community on where that water goes once it enters the storm drains. The message "No Dumping/Drains to Lake" or "No Dumping/Drains to Stream" will help to discourage individuals from putting anything other than stormwater into the storm drain system.

## From the Tax Collector

If you own real estate in South Middleton Township, you should have received a County and Municipal Real Estate Bill in March and a School District Real Estate Bill in July. These bills are based on the assessed value of your real estate. Taxes due on your real estate depend on the millage rate established by these taxing authorities. If you are paying your taxes through online/web banking, please remember to put the tax bill number in the memo section. I do accept debit or credit cards and e-checks as a form of payment. The processing company charges a 2.4% processing fee, based on the amount of your bill, to use a debit or credit card and a flat \$2.95 for an e-check. These fees will be added on to your payment. To pay by debit or credit card or e-check, come to my office in the Township Building or go to my website [smtaxvarner.com](http://smtaxvarner.com). I also accept cash, personal checks, business checks, or money orders as forms of payment. There is a slot in my office door for payments brought during non-office hours. Thank you!

# Township Ordinances and Resolutions

Over the past several months, the Board of Supervisors has considered and approved a number of ordinances and resolutions. A copy of these documents can be found on the Township's website or obtained at the Township office. ### Massage Therapist Registration Ordinance – Ordinance No. 2019-03

Repeals Ordinance No. 2007-02. NOTE: State law is more stringent.

### Subdivision & Land Development Ordinance – Ordinance No. 2019-04

In parking lots, requires the placement of a landscape island every 50 (increased from ten) spaces, or at the end of every parking row, whichever is less.

### Storm Water Management District (Westgate) – Ordinance No. 2019-05

Creates a special storm water district to cover the Westgate development.

## Fall Brush Pickup

Fall Brush Pickup will begin September 23 and run to October 4. The yard waste put out for collection shall be prepared as follows:

- Brush trimmings and branches to be bundled using twine or cotton string. (NO WIRES)
- Bundles shall not exceed 4 feet in length.
- Bundles shall not weigh more than 40 pounds.
- No garden residue consisting of fruits or vegetables, weeds, or plants will be accepted. The Township is not permitted to accept these materials under its leaf and yard waste composting permit.



## Fall Leaf Pickup

Fall Leaf Pickup will begin November 4 and run to December 13. Bundle your leaves in an untied bag at the curb, and the Public Works crew will take care of them. Due to weather and staffing limitations, it is impossible to have a set schedule. However, it is our intent to cover the entire Township at least once every week.

## Update on Your Water and Sewer Services

**FORGE RD. ACRES:** The Sewer and Water Replacement Project – Phase 1, is nearing completion. The Authority has replaced all of the sewer and water mains, manholes, valves, and laterals from the main to the property line. The paving has been completed and lawn and shoulder restoration is still progressing. Phase I, which has been in progress since early 2018, encompasses the area along and to the east of Forge Road. A second phase, which will include the area to the west of Forge Road, is being advertised for bid opening in August 2019.

### SEWER SERVICES:

In addition to the Forge Rd. Acres Project (Phase 1), future Sewer Improvement Projects under consideration over the next several years are:

- Forge Rd. Acres – Phase 2
- Upgrade of Pump Station No. 2 – Fairview St.
- Sewer Extension along Fairview St.
- Purchase of new Flusher Truck (the new truck is on order for later this year)
- Participation in Carlisle's Sewer Interceptor Rehab. Project

Regarding your sewer rates, a 5% increase became effective for the first quarter of 2019. This had the effect of adding \$2.05 per month to each residential sewer bill. Commercial, industrial, and public accounts were increased by the same percentage. No additional increase is being proposed at this time.

### WATER SERVICES:

The Authority completed the interconnection of our two water distribution systems in the S. Spring Garden Street and Bonnybrook Road areas in July 2018. This interconnect has increased our operational flexibility for both systems and will also improve our ability to provide adequate water during supply problems or major water leaks.

In addition to the Forge Rd. Acres Project (Phase 1), future Water Improvement Projects under consideration over the next several years are:

- Forge Rd. Acres – Phase 2
- Water Main Replacement along S. Spring Garden St.
- Replacement of water mains along portions of Park Drive
- Construction of a new water storage tank in the Well No. 1, Park Drive area
- Development of a new water well near Well No. 1, Park Drive area
- Removal of Storage Tank No. 3 along Marsh Drive

Regarding your water rates, a 10% water rate increase became effective for the first quarter of 2019. This had the effect of adding \$1.84 per month to each typical residential water bill (based on a system wide average of 13,000 gallons per quarter). Commercial, industrial, and public accounts were increased by the same percentage. No additional increase is being proposed at this time.

Must be a South Middleton Township resident. Please remove all containers and bags.

- Accepted**
- Leaves on leaf pile only
  - Brush/shrubbery clippings
  - Dry ornamental grass
  - Logs under 8" diameter/less than 6' long
  - Pine cones and seed pods in compost only
  - Shrubbery roots that are free of dirt and stones

- Not Accepted**
- Weeds from garden
  - Grass clippings, garbage, dirt, stones
  - Nuts, fruit, vegetables
  - Corn fodder, corn cobs, mulch/old compost
  - Construction materials
  - Logs over 8" in diameter

- The Compost Site is a No Smoking facility.
- Residents are required to have an access sticker affixed to their windshield (preferably in the lower corner of the passenger side) or access will be denied.
- No commercial business or hauler may drop off or pick up any product without a completed authorization form. The forms are available at the Township office and must be signed by a Township resident.
- Leaf mulch and tanbark are free to Township residents, but must be hand loaded by the resident.
- Due to the high probability of vehicle damage or bodily harm, Township residents and employees are prohibited from machine loading any product.
- The Township staff appreciates the cooperation of all involved with the operation of the compost site, as we pride ourselves in providing a quality product free of charge in a safe environment to all residents.
