From the Manager's Desk...

South Middleton adopted its \$17.1 million 2024 budget late last year. This is an increase over the previous year reflecting the Township's assumption of management and operation of the South Middleton Municipal Authority (sewer/water).

We anticipate spending \$2.9 million on road and transportation projects. This is 30 percent more than 2023, supported in part by a modest increase in the road tax. As the Township assumes more roads, as our infrastructure ages, and as we receive lower amounts of state aid, this increase was necessary. Also, we must ensure that our emergency services are adequately supported. For this reason, we also slightly increased our fire tax. Of Cumberland County's 33 municipalities, South Middleton Township's overall tax rate is directly in the middle of the pack (16 higher, 16 lower).

We continue to prioritize utilizing grant funding to support many of our larger public works projects. Elsewhere in this Talk of the Township, you can read about the status of work in Boiling Springs. Our new Spring Meadows Park active play area should be completed, which includes a large new playground and senior fitness circuit (DCNR C2P2 grant). At South Middleton Park, two new tennis courts and three pickleball courts will be ready for use (DCNR Greenways & Trails grant).

Due to the help of our legislative delegation, the Township/Authority also received a \$1.75 million grant to construct a new water tank at Well No. 1 (Park Drive) (State ARPA). The multi-million dollar water/sewer upgrade project is also ongoing along South Spring Garden Street (LSA grant; County ARPA).

Finally, the Carlisle Airport continues to be profitable. Last year, we installed new runway lighting. This \$550,000 project was funded in large part by state aviation grants. This year, we will work on obstruction removal and facilities expansion.

South Middleton Takes the Lead on Reviewing Food Processing Residuals

Earlier this year, South Middleton tasked its solicitor Salzmänn-Hughes to evaluate and review the practice of applying food processing residuals (FPRs) to area farmland. FPRs are the leftover byproducts (waste water, animal hides, blood, bones, fruit/vegetable seeds and peels, cheese whey, etc.) resulting from meat, dairy, and vegetable processing activity. They have been applied directly to the land as fertilizer and can be noted for the pungent odor that accompanies the practice. FPR application has seen strict regulation in neighboring states but is minimally controlled in Pennsylvania. The practice has seen an increase in Cumberland County in recent years.

The reason behind the Township's efforts is not necessarily to ban the activity, and is definitely not to punish farmers, but to ensure the practice is properly regulated. It is necessary to guarantee that local officials understand what is being applied to the land, not only for the health, safety, and welfare of Township residents but also our farmers and those downstream and downwind from us.

South Middleton has taken the lead statewide on this issue. We have begun a coalition with neighboring communities, including Cumberland County, to evaluate the practice and determine proper next steps to ensure this practice is properly regulated moving forward.

Spring Brush Pickup

Spring brush pickup will begin April 15th and run through April 29th. **If you have brush to be picked up, please call the Township Office at 717-258-5324.**

The yard waste put out for collection must be prepared as follows:

- Brush trimmings and branches to be bundled using twine or cotton string. (NO WIRES)
- Bundles shall not exceed 4 feet in length.
- Bundles shall not weigh more than 40 pounds.
- No garden residue consisting of fruits or vegetables, weeds, or plants will be accepted. The Township is not permitted to accept these materials under our leaf and yard waste composting permit.

Permit Requirements

Did you know...most major home improvement projects require a permit? Before starting work on your property, please contact the Township to determine if a permit is required. Starting a project without a permit may result in additional fees and the permit cost will be doubled.

PERMIT NEEDED: Above-ground/in-ground pools, solar panels, additions/alterations to dwellings, decks, accessory structures, patios, fences, shed, carports, signs, basement remodels if changing the means of egress (adding walls or partitions is considered changing the egress) or making any structural changes.

PERMIT NOT NEEDED: If no structural changes are being made—replacing windows, re-shingling roofs, replacing siding, replacing door. Also security alarms, and temporary pods.

Boiling Springs Projects Update

There are a number of major projects ongoing in the village of Boiling Springs. Work is well underway on the three-phase, \$2.2 million pedestrian improvement project. The first phase is almost complete, the installation of sidewalks, traffic control devices, and storm water features on 1st Street. This project is funded in part by a CFA MTF grant, as well as an allocation from Cumberland County through its American Rescue Act funding.

The next phase will see Front Street converted into a one-way road, with sidewalks, parking, and new lighting. The boat launch parking lot will be repaved and the intersection with Mountain Road/Race Street will be redesigned. A mini-roundabout will be installed at the intersection of 1st Street/Front Street. Parts of this project is funded by another MTF grant, a HATS Regional Transportation grant, and a Fish & Boat Commission boat grant.

In 2021, the Township acquired the former ATC office (the ATC relocated prior to a new location). Unfortunately, after an analysis, we were forced to condemn the structure as structurally unsound. However, we recently received a Keystone Historic Preservation grant to study the building, and engaged Hammel Associates Architects to study and offer designs for rehabilitation and reuse.

The credit/debit card and echeck processing company charges a 2.4% processing fee that is based on the amount of your bill for credit and debit card payments and a flat \$2.95 for echeck payments. Help reduce stormwater runoff pollution

Stormwater runoff is rain that falls on streets, parking areas, gravel lots, rooftops or other developed land and flows directly into nearby storm drains, lakes and streams. The rain picks up and mixes with what's on the ground including:

- Oil, grease, metals and coolants from vehicles;
- Fertilizers, pesticides and other chemicals from gardens and homes;
- Bacteria from pet wastes and failing septic systems;
- Soil from construction sites and other bare ground;
- Soaps from car or equipment washing; and
- Accidental spills, leaky storage containers, tobacco spit and whatever else ends up on the ground.
- The polluted runoff then rushes into nearby gutters and storm drains and into streams, lakes, rivers and bays. Stormwater runoff enters these waters without being cleaned of pollutants.

Here are some things you can do to help minimize stormwater problems:

1. Maintain your car or truck. Never dump anything down a storm drain. Always recycle used oil, antifreeze and other fluids. Fix oil leaks in your vehicles.
2. Wash your car at a commercial car wash rather than in the street or in your driveway. If you wash your car at home, wash it on your lawn.
3. Cut down on fertilizers, pesticides and herbicides. If you use these chemicals, follow directions and use them sparingly. Don't fertilize before a rainstorm.

Consider using organic fertilizers. Let your lawn go golden brown in the summer months; it will rebound in the fall. Compost or mulch lawn clippings. Preserve existing trees or plant new ones - trees hold rainfall and help manage stormwater.



4. Remove part or all of your lawn. Lawns require a lot of watering, mowing and caring. Replace part of your lawn with native, drought-resistant plants. Add compost to planting soil and dress it with mulch to improve plant growth and reduce stormwater runoff.
5. If you are on a septic system, maintain the system. Septic systems require regular inspections, maintenance and pumping, or they will fail, cost a lot of money to fix and could pollute nearby lakes and streams. Have a professional inspector check your system regularly and have it pumped out when needed and required.
6. Pick up after your pets and keep animals out of streams. Scoop your dog's waste and properly dispose of it. Also, make sure fences and other structures are keeping cows, horses and other animals out of streams. Compost manure in a designated area so that it doesn't wash off into nearby waterways.
7. Reduce impervious surfaces at home and increase the vegetated land cover of your property. Impervious surfaces include your roof, driveway, patios and lawn. Reduce rooftop runoff by directing your downspouts to vegetated areas, and not to the storm drain on your street.

South Middleton's Trash & Recycling Contract Begins

As of now, most if not all Township residents should have received their new trash and recycling bins (or tags, depending on your service option) from Waste Management (WM). Since the new contract began at the beginning of March, we have received a significant number of questions. This article seeks to address some of those questions/concerns.

Due to the Township's population size and urban footprint, we are mandated under state law, to require all residents participate in our solid waste/recycling program. Further, under public health and safety concerns, it is also necessary for us to ensure that all waste generated within our boundaries are properly disposed of. That is why it is not feasible for us to excuse or exempt anyone from having trash/recycling service. Requiring that everyone sign-up for trash/recycling service with the Township's contracted waste/recycling hauler is the only effective and efficient way to do this. That is also why it is not possible to allow individual residents to contract with their own waste/recycling hauler. Even if we could allow for this, with numerous hypothetical trash and recycling trucks running throughout Township neighborhoods on conflicting days, it would create safety and logistical concerns and would likely not reduce costs anyway.

As for why the Township contracted with WM, and the increase in cost; it is not lost on us that residents will see an 80 percent increase in their bill. However, this was not unexpected; nor was it not forewarned. We discussed this issue often in past newsletters and at numerous Board of Supervisors meetings. For the past five years, South Middleton was extraordinarily fortunate with the cost of trash and recycling. Those rates were based on 2018 prices. Obviously, a lot has happened over that time. So much so, that in 2021, after WM acquired Advanced Disposal, WM asked us to allow them to increase their rates, which we denied. Those favorable rates, again, agreed to five years ago, could not last forever. Trash/recycling is a highly volatile market, so it was inevitable that when the new contract was bid, the costs would increase. The new contracted cost actually places South Middleton at the market rate with neighboring communities of similar size and layout.

Waste Management was the lowest bidder. Again, we are legally required under state law to competitively bid and contract with the lowest bidder for this service. In 2022 and 2021, the last two times South Middleton put its trash/recycling contract out for bid, we only received one bidder - WM. In the lead up to the new contract, for much of 2023, the Township reached out to/met with numerous waste/recycling businesses, encouraging them to bid on the 2024 contract. We received only three bidders - again,

WM was the lowest (meaning the other two were more expensive). The Township is not a private business - we could not negotiate for the best price - we could legally only go with the lowest bid, as submitted.

Further, in order to make the bid as fair and attractive as possible, we required the successful bidder to guarantee new toters for their customers, which is why everyone received new trash/recycling containers (even if they were new to begin with). Also, we retained the option for residents to have the choice of the Per Bag Service, which has been popular for those residences that generate less trash/recycling. Please be aware, almost the entire waste industry asked that we remove that option since it is so equipment and labor intensive. We kept it in regardless, to give our residents a choice. It is boutique service, which is why it ended up being so expensive. Note, the price quoted in the Winter/Spring 2024 Newsletter was a typo. The contract, both options (bag and flat rate), is for three-years; with two, one-year possible renewals. Flat Rate costs: year 1 - \$419.76; year 2 - \$438.60; year 3 - \$458.28; Per Bag Rate costs: year 1 - \$408; year 2 - \$432; year 3 - \$456

South Middleton Township is large in area. We are among the largest non-county municipalities in geographic area in the entire Commonwealth. Furthermore, we are not just spread out, we have urbanized clusters and scattered housing developments. Some properties are on large, multi-acre plots, others on traditional smaller lots. We have farms and apartments, townhomes, mobile home parks, and mansions. We are a challenging community to cover, with numerous trucks running every day of the week. Even if we could partner with surrounding communities in a joint bid, based on those factors and our own analysis, there was no reason to believe it would lead to more bidders or a decrease in cost. It could not be done anyway since all of our neighbors' contracts are on a different term period.

Moving forward, if you still have old toters, it means that for whatever reason, WM did not collect them the first time around. Let us know if you still have old containers and we will let WM know to come and get them. We have been informed that they recycle them for reuse elsewhere.

WM would likely be the first to acknowledge that their performance in the early 2020s was unsatisfactory. Late 2022 and 2023 however saw a marked turnaround in on-the-ground service and a major fall-off in complaints. If you experience issues related to WM service, including issues with customer service, please let the Township know.

Compost Site Rules

Must be a South Middleton Township resident. Please remove all containers and bags.

Accepted

- Leaves on leaf pile only
- Brush/shrubbery clippings
- Dry ornamental grass
- Logs under 8" diameter/less than 6' long
- Pine cones and seed pods in compost only
- Shrubbery roots that are free of dirt and stones

Not Accepted

- Weeds from garden
- Grass clippings, garbage, dirt, stones
- Nuts, fruit, vegetables
- Corn fodder, corn cobs, mulch/old compost
- Construction materials
- Logs over 8" in diameter
- The Compost Site is a *No Smoking* facility.
- Residents are required to have an access sticker affixed to their windshield (preferably in the lower corner of the passenger side) or access will be denied.
- No commercial business or hauler may drop off or pick up any product without a completed authorization form. The forms are available at the Township office and must be signed by a Township resident.
- Leaf mulch and tanbark are free to Township residents, but must be hand loaded by the resident.
- Due to the high probability of vehicle damage or bodily harm, Township residents and employees are prohibited from machine loading any product.
- The Township staff appreciates the cooperation of all involved with the operation of the compost site, as we pride ourselves in providing a quality product free of charge in a safe environment to all residents.
